Dear Parents and Careers

Tournament of Minds offers real world benefits as it looks beyond academic achievement and understands that the pursuit of excellence knows no boundaries.

The Tournament process provides a platform for excellence and equips participants with twenty-first century skills and strategies.

St Raphael's Team 2 consisted of Mila, Maria, Leo, and Reggie. Their long-term challenge was on The Arts. They had to design and assemble a presentation based on a particular artist. They needed a soundscape to match and persuade the audience why their installation should be chosen.

Both teams then participated in a short-term spontaneous challenge. This requires rapid interchange of ideas, the ability to think creatively and group cooperation skills.

# From the School Counsellor




#### Is my child anxious or just angry?

# Year 1 Class Page




In Visual Arts this term, the Year 1 learners used Viewpoints to explore the artwork of Aboriginal artist Judy Watson, a Waanyi artist from north-east Queensland. They were inspired by Judy's spine and teeth artwork (mundirri banga mayi, 2019) to create their own artwork using natural objects. Students collected leaves and used them to create leaf monoprints. This week, learners will also be using natural objects such as rocks, gum nuts and seedpods, to stamp onto their artwork. Then, finally they will use bush brushes to add paint textures to their masterpiece. This project has enabled our Year 1 learners to connect with God through nature as part of our school wide nature and spirituality inquiry this term.



# Learner Writings

School Arrival Time


